PAST EVENTS

Irishman's Vintage Car rally King's Birthday Weekend 2024

2024 was the 70th year this event has been run. It is the Third oldest Vintage motoring event in the world. The London to Brighton being the oldest, starting in 1905.

It is open to Vintage and Veteran vehicles only. 1931 cars or older.

It's origin in the name as the first ten years of the event were held at Irishman's Creek Station, where the Jet boat was developed, and Bill Hamilton who was the owner of the station and inventor was very interested in old cars.

The rally focusses on off road, farm tacks, and river crossing, as would have been the norm back in the 1910's to the late 1920's. Chains and tow ropes must be carried.

Usually, the event is two days always based on the Saturday and Sunday nights in Fairlie, being where it moved to after the departure from Irishman's Creek Station, in 1964.

This year saw 215 cars (of which over half are Model A's) enter with 500 plus people involved. A large undertaking to organise, and as is the case with old cars and the weather, a lot cannot be planned for. But all went very well in 2024.

Friday morning the rally started in Rangiora, with the route going across farms and up the Waipara Gorge to Lunch in Hawarden, and travelling out, in the afternoon, via MacDonald Downs, and back over the Okuku Pass Forestry roads.

Saturday morning saw us all in Sheffield, with a pumpkin canon announcing the start of the day. Lunch time saw a visit to Mesopotamia Station up the Rangitata Gorge. Laurie Prouting gave us a talk on the history of the station and the local area.

Sunday the run returned to Irishman Creek station with a look over the sheds where the jet boat was developed back in the 1950's, also the Hydro Electric power station still in use today, 100 years after it was built. I (Andy Fox) took my 1927 Cadillac. This V8 (all Cadillac cars were V8 powered from 1915 on) gets along very well. It is an Australian new car (hence it is Right hand drive). It is an open Sports Phaeton, meaning 4 doors and a roof that can fold down. Gets along at 100 kms/hour very happily, with a reasonable amount of power.

The car boasts the instrumentation out of Al Capones actual car, where the Australian owner went back to the State in the 1970's to get parts, he meet someone who back in the day was Capones mechanic. He swapped the instruments out but kept the ones he took out and passed them onto the Ozzie visitor who was hunting for parts to restore his car. Hence the cars name is "Elliot" after Elliot Ness the FBI agent who put Capone behind bars for tax evasion. (if you Google Al-Capone-Cadillac you come up with some great images of his actual bullet proof car)

However, on the Friday early evening disaster struck, with the Cadillac arriving back in Christchurch with limited power and a lot of missing and back firing. Seemed like fuel, but the old saying 80% of fuel problems are ignition proved to be true with a dead flat battery, and the generator not working.

The disgraced Cadillac was parked up and the veteran of 20 Irishman's rally, my 1922 Rolls Royce Silver

This was a highlight event of the year. Sandra Olliver






TIDBITS

Imagine we lived in a world where all cars were EVs, and then along comes a new invention, the "Internal Combustion Engine"! Think how well they would sell: A vehicle half the weight, half the price that will almost quarter the damage done to the road. A vehicle that can be refuelled in 1/10th of the time and has a range of up to 4 times the distance in all weather conditions. It does not rely on the environmentally damaging use of non-renewable rare earth elements to power it, and use far less steel and other materials.

Just think how excited people would be for such technology, it would sell like hot cakes!


Have you got 7 teeth or only 2 teeth?

If you have 7 teeth on your 28/29/ early 30 steering box sector shaft, you're in luck.

AUTHENTICALLY SPEAKING

There is a way of eliminating just about all the steering wheel play in a 7-tooth box. Factory play was about 25mm (or in the old money, nearly an inch).

This is how. For a 7 tooth only, wheel play is reduced by installing an eccentric one-piece phosphor bronze bush. Bush size: ID 1", OD 1 1/4", length 4" adjusted to length. Spiral







bush must to go in with the spital the same way. Take a photo with your phone. True up the sector shaft first. The bush is firstly bored 3/64" off centre, to within 1/16" the sector ID. The bush is pressed into the sector housing in just the right



place. If not, you will have twice as much backlash. To align the bush in the exact position is not easy. You only have one go. The thickest part of the bush aligns up to the bottom box mounting hole. Red arrow.

This was done by marking each end of the bush with a fine felt pen at the thickest wall point. Mark a fine line along the outside of the bush from one end to the other, and another

fine line between the two steering box mounting holes on the box mounting face. The bush is pressed into place on the marks, but the trick is to have it exactly in the right position before any pressure is applied, otherwise you cannot turn it once it has been partly pressed in. The last operation, back in the lathe, was boring, and honing to the sector size, plus 0.0015". Honing to final size is absolutely imperative. Aim for a tight sliding fit when lubricated with heavy oil. The heavy oil will take up about .001". Do not forget to drill the bush from the outside of the housing for the grease nipple.

The seven tooth has equal backlash at any point of the turning circle. (Different to the two tooth.) In the seven-tooth box, the worm wears at only the centre of the worm, where the worm that contacts the sector and its wear is the same in any steering wheel position. The sector has the centre tooth plus a partial contact of the teeth either side of centre in contact





with the worm in the straight-ahead position. When the steering is at the ends of the sector movement, there is an unworn area of the sector in contact with the worm and can bind the steering if you have not followed the bush

positioning exactly. There is only one adjustment. It is the screw and nut on the cover plate. This moves the sector closer or further away from the worm, taking up end float in the sector. If you are using a good or new sector shaft then the teeth of the sector have a slight angle across the teeth, allowing for adjustment in back lash. If this does not allow for adjustment of back lash, you have a problem with the sector, or are missing something from the steering. Never fill your steering box with grease. I use a mixture of half grease and half oil and filling can take ages, but it is worth it. To stop leakage from the bottom of the box fit the 'no leak 7 tooth' tube pictured. The top of the tube is above oil level and no oil can escape providing you have a good gasket at the box bottom. Use the brass shims to eliminate up and own play of the steering shaft.

DO YOU KNOW THE MODEL "A"?

A Course of Questions with Detailed Answers Covering
Various Mechanical Phases of the NEW FORD.

ARTICLE 2

THE FRONT AXLE.

Question 9. Do new Model A front radius rods inter-fere with removal of crank case?

Answer 9. The new Model A FORD front radius rods are so designed as to permit the easy removal of the oil pan from the engine by dropping it down between the radius rods, without the necessity of first removing the rods themselves. This is an advantage in servicing the car.

Question 10. How is the front radius rod ball socket lubricated?

Answer 10. The front radius rod ball socket is automatically lubricated through a hole in the clutch housing, where a felt washer absorbs waste oil from the transmission case.

Question 11. Is front radius rod ball cap held by studs or bolts? Explain advantages of this construction.

Answer 11. The front radius rod ball cap is held by through bolts, which eliminate any possibility of stripping the threads, and make easy the replacement of worn parts.

Question 12. Explain how front radius rod ball socket is replaced.

Answer 12. After removing the nuts which hold the front radius ball cap in position, we slip off the two sleeves (which cover the bolts and protect them from the chafing and wear of ball cap). Then we can remove, if necessary, the two bolts which hold ball cap in place. These bolts are held in place by a slender bolt, extending through clutch housing, which passes through the slots in the heads of both ball socket bolts. We can then work through opening in bottom of clutch housing to replace the ball socket bolts.

Question 13. How many leaves, how wide are leaves, and of what kind of steel is new Model A front spring? How does it differ from Model T spring?

Answer 13. The front spring of the Model A FORD has ten leaves, of thin, flexible section, and of Chrome steel. They are $1^3/^4$ Inches wide. The new Model A front spring also differs from the Model T spring in having less arch or camber.

A Young Henry Ford from Henry Ford's "A Personal History"

The Early Years

Henry Ford was fortunate in his surroundings and early life. His father was a prosperous, respected citizen of the community, and he grew to maturity in the longest era of peace the young republic had known. Michigan, with the rest of the country was to begin a period of industrial expansion unequaled in history. Boys were



to leave the farms as part of a growing urbanization that would not be checked until mass-produced automobiles made possible the suburban movement.

In 1863 these deep and swift running currents of change were still but a springhead, and the childhood memories of Henry Ford were of a simple life. Years later (1913) Henry Ford was to write that his first memory was of his father showing him and his brother John a bird's nest under a fallen oak some twenty rods east of his home. The awakening of the child to the beauty of nature was not accidental, and he was to see his father turn his plow from the furrow to leave a bird's nest undisturbed. In one of his many jot books, Henry Ford had written his own story of this incident. Grandfather O'Hern (as he was called) also taught the child the simple pleasures of nature-the names of the flowers that bordered the field, the trees in the woods, and the feathered and furred creatures that made their homes in the fields and forests near the homestead. A love of nature was a central part of Henry Ford's being throughout his life.

1871 First Day of School January 11

Mary Ford, despite the burdens of a growing family, (John 1865, Margaret 1867, Jane 1869, William 1871 and Robert 1873) found time to instill in the child her own sense of cleanliness and order. She also taught him to read, and when on January 11, 1871, Henry walked 1 1/2 miles to the Scotch Settlement School for the first time; he had already mastered the first McGuffey Reader.

Henry was not a "book-minded" scholar. His interest in mechanics was predominant, and machines were to be his library. However he and his seatmate, Edsel Ruddiman, along with the other children in the neighborhood mastered their three r's in the small brick school of the Scotch Settlement.

1873The Miller School

In 1873 Henry changed to the Miller School, about the same distance from his home but located to the west in Dearborn Township. He had become curious about the power of steam, and in what was to be his customary approach, subjected his ideas to a practical test. He tied down the lid of an earthen pot filled with water, placed it over the fire and awaited with interest the results of his experiment. The inevitable explosion not only ruined the pot but scalded the curious boy with boiling water. Reprimanded by his mother, his next experiments were more controlled, one of them being a baking powder can steam engine with a watch wheel for a power drive. This was followed by a larger steam engine made in cooperation with his classmates at the Miller School, but once again a boiler explosion proved the power of steam and burned down the Miller School fence in the process.

Watches next attracted his attention and he soon mastered their intricate mechanisms. He had no tools for the delicate task of watch repairing so he made his own; a filed shingle nail became a screw driver, a corset stay became a pair of tweezers and extra knitting needles were similarly adapted by the skilled boy. The small workbench before the window in his bedroom was soon covered with the watches of his friends and neighbors.

An Interest in All Things Mechanical



Henry's interest in watches was only one phase of his curiosity about all things mechanical, and while watch repairing was always to remain his hobby, he discovered the adult world of steam. In July 1876, Fred Reden brought into the Dearborn area the first portable steam engine Henry Ford had ever seen. Reden encouraged Henry's youthful enthusiasm by letting him fire and run the engine. Years later Henry Ford was to testify that this proved to him that he was by instinct an engineer. The same year, Henry's already aroused interest and talent were diverted into new channels when in company with his father he saw a portable engine moving along the road under its own power. The excited youth jumped off of his father's wagon and was examining this new curiosity before the amused and tolerant man was really aware of what had happened. The intensity of Henry's interest is indicated by his own sharp memory of this incident a quarter of a century later. The youth had seen the possibilities of a self-contained, self-propelled vehicle and the vision of a horseless carriage born at this moment was never to leave Henry Ford until success fulfilled his dream.

1876Mary Ford, his mother, dies..

The same year that Henry Ford first realized he had the instincts of an engineer; the Ford family was shocked by the death of the mother, Mary on May 29, 1876. Her quiet forcefulness and strong moral influence had been the guiding spirit for the entire family. In his own words Henry Ford felt that, "the house was now a watch without a mainspring.



Henry Ford had now lost his strongest tie with the family home.

Hating the drudgery of farming, he devoted more and more time to mechanical subjects and finally resolved to become a machinist apprentice in Detroit. Although his father regretted Henry's wish to leave what to William was the ideal way of life, he did not oppose his son's decision. At the age of 16 Henry Ford left his father's farm and traveled to Detroit where he could learn what he needed to know about mechanics in order to fulfill his dreams.
