
will run members advertisements for a *maximum 3 months*, after which time they will be removed. If the member wishes



DO YOU KNOW THE MODEL "A"?

A Course of Questions with Detailed Answers Covering

Various Mechanical Phases of the NEW FORD.

ARTICLE 2

THE FRONT AXLE.

Question 6. What kinds of joint connections are used in the spindle connecting rods, and the drag link or steering gear connecting rod of the new Model A FORD? What are the advantages of this construction?

Answer 6. The joints or connections of the steering gear connecting rod or drag link and the spindle connecting rod are of ball-and-socket type, with spring take-up adjustment, which keeps these joints permanently tight and snug, eliminates rattles, and reduces any tendency to front wheel wabble and shimmy, which are more apt to be present on any car fitted with front wheel brakes and balloon tyres.

Question 7. How were early Model T radius rods attached to front axle? How were later Model T radius rods attached to front axle? Why? How are new Model A front radius rods attached to front axle? What are the advantages of this construction?

Answer 7. Early Model T front radius rods were bolted to the spring perches above the front axle. Later Model T FORD front radius rods were bolted to the spring perches below the axle, thus giving a stronger construction and steadier steering.

New Model A Ford front radius rods are bolted to both top and bottom, gripping the front axle in fingers of steel and making a very strong and secure construction, which holds the front axle firmly against any twist imposed by the front wheel brakes, or any thrust due to the front wheels striking road obstructions.

Question 8. Why are new Model A front radius rods of different cross-section from the Model T radius rods? Explain the reasons for the difference?

Answer 8. Because the new Model A front radius rods are subjected to a "bending" stress in resisting the twist imposed on the axle by the front wheel brakes, the elliptical or deeper section of the radius rods is better designed to resist this strain. The round section front radius rods of Model T FORDS only acted as columns or supports, in resisting thrusts imposed in the axle by the wheels.

Are you bearing up?

Authentically Speaking

Two of the most important bearings in your vehicle are the rear wheel bearings. A-1115-B Rear Hub and Drum.

These bearings are easily forgotten, but must be maintained on a reasonably regular basis.



Bearing Removal.

Remove the rear brake drum and the rear bearing will be evident. Removal is easier said than done. Firstly, remove the snap ring holding the bearing seal in place. and carefully leaver the snap ring from its retaining groove. Watch your fingers. The bearing seal A-1175 is usually a tight fit into the bearing housing and requires either complete destruction or an angled bar to lever outwards. Use

a small prybar as pictured to remove the seal. Either way, never reuse any old seals. The bearing can now be easily removed. It



will probably be dirty and require a complete clean out in solvent. Inspect the inside of the bearing housing for wear. If the bearing is in good condition, pack well with wheel bearing grease. With over greasing, the excess grease can travel out past

the seal if even partially worn, and the more you pump the more it collects around the braking components and some may travel toward the differential. **Don't over grease** when periodically greasing.



If the internal bearing surface of the rear hub has worn, there is a sleeve available to install with a new size bearing, which has a different OD from the original.

Part number for the kit: A-1115-RK. One kit does one wheel. Some machining will be involved. All

parts are available including all bearings and studs. New roller bearings, seals, studs and sleeve kits are all available, even complete drums with hubs installed.

You are now ready to install the complete drum back to the vehicle. Firstly, the most important part of the exercise is to have **dry tapers** and a **dry mating surface inside the hub**. Check the **axle housing** for wear on the underside. (Red arrow)



If you are installing <u>new rear hub studs</u>, the heads of the studs are flush with the inside of the drum, as the A-23488-S8 emergency

toggle connecting link pin comes very close to the inside of the drum, especially if the rear axle and hub tapers have worn, allowing the drum to travel into the axle. (This is where an axle shim may be required to push the drum outwards.) If you are installing new drums to your good hubs, you will need a full set (and a

few spares) of new hub bolts. Both front and rear studs are different and have to be pressed into place with a very heavy press. This is a machine shop job.

A Young Henry Ford from Henry Ford's "A Personal History"

1832: Samuel and George Ford arrive from Ireland and settle in Dearborn Township in Michigan

Michigan was a crude world but one of promise to Samuel and George Ford, former tenants on an estate in the village of Ballenascarthy, County Cork, Ireland. They left behind them in Ireland, their widowed mother, Rebecca Jennings Ford and their older brother John maintained the family tenancy. Samuel and George soon began the continuous battle with the elements, duplicating the experience of all pioneer farm families as they carved a home from the virgin forest.

1847: John and William Ford, grandfather and father of Henry Ford arrive from Ireland and settle in Dearborn

Samuel Ford died in 1842, but his grown sons carried on the family work, and along with George Ford, had become well established by 1847. Cattle, cleared fields planted with crops and rude but substantial homes testified to their industry and persistence. Michigan had prospered with them, rising to a sovereign state but ten years before it was now dotted with small settlements. Detroit had nearly 20,000 people and a thriving waterfront industry was laying a foundation for the future.

Reports from America of personal prosperity and the taming of the wilderness became ever more enticing to the family in Ireland. At last in 1847, the seventy-one year old Rebecca Ford with her married sons, John and Robert, set sail for the new world. The voyage proved especially tragic to John and his seven children, for Thomasine Ford, wife and mother, did not survive the trip. The saddened family, leaving Robert Ford and his family in Canada, continued on to join their kin in Dearborn Township where their sorrow would be eased by the hard work of a new world.

The new arrivals were welcomed and given a home until they could make one for themselves. John was not long in locating Henry Maybury, an old acquaintance from Ireland, who was willing to sell eighty acres of his land to the newcomer. On January 15, 1848, John Ford became a landowner in Redford Township and began to clear the trees for his home, which was to stand on what is now the corner of Joy and Evergreen Roads.

John and his family still faced primitive conditions but the area had improved rapidly since the year of George and Samuel's arrival. Not far away was the flourishing town of Dearbornville with a Methodist church, a sawmill, flourmill, seven stores, two smithies, an iron foundry, railroad stop and some sixty families. To the south on what later became Warren Avenue the sturdy Scotch Settlement had erected a schoolhouse (1839) on the northeast corner of Richard Gardner's land. Within the surrounding area, the

Aided by his sons, John Ford began the arduous task of clearing his land. He and his oldest son William also found employment for their skill with tools in the construction of the westward extension of the Michigan Central Railroad. The money from these efforts was used to raise the mortgage John had taken to purchase the farm and to carry the family expenses until their land could make them independent.

population numbered almost 5,000. The frontier period was drawing to a close.

This copy of a tintype (ca. 1850 -55) was copied at the request of Henry Ford in 1924, and labeled "Mr. Ford's Grandfather."

1858: William Ford becomes landowner

William Ford was a wiry young man of medium height, with high cheekbones and firm bone structure that were characteristic of the Ford family. Born and raised on an Irish tenancy, he had a deep respect for the independent life of the landowning farmer and his persistent industry was directed toward the time when he himself could become a landholder. By 1858, he had saved enough to realize his ambition. On September 15 of that year, he purchased the southern half of his father's farm for \$600, while his brother Samuel bought the northern half for the same sum.

In addition to his own farm, William Ford worked for (or with) Patrick O'Hern, a prosperous farmer whose ninety-one acres straddled the junction line between Dearborn and Springwells Townships. O'Hern like the Fords had emigrated from County Cork (1830) to the Detroit area where he married Margaret Stevens on July 15, 1834. Beginning in 1841, the O'Herns purchased land in Dearborn and Springwells Townships and made their home at what is now the corner of Ford and Greenfield Roads.

1861: William Ford weds Mary Litogot

While at the O'Hern home, William Ford met Mary Litogot, an attractive, dark-eyed young woman. After

she was orphaned by the accidental death of her father, Mary Litogot had found the love and affection of true parents in Margaret and Patrick O'Hern. The friendship of William and Mary ripened into romance, fulfilled by marriage on April 25, 1861. Once again, former friends of Ireland shared in the Ford happiness as Thomas Maybury opened his home for the wedding ceremony.

The newly wed couple moved into the rude log structure of the

O'Hern home, while William planned and constructed a new house to be occupied by both families. Later in 1867, the entire holdings of the O'Hern family were transferred to William and Mary Ford.


In 1861, the two families moved into their new, seven-room home, an imposing house for its day, to which four rooms would be later, added. William Ford had become the head of the household with a large and profitable farm under his supervision. Soon his appointments as deacon of the church, member of the school board and justice of the peace would recognize him as a valuable member of the community.

1863: Henry Ford is born on July 30th

It was this background of relative prosperity and mutual affection that was to nurture a boy whose name was to become a household word throughout the world, for it was here in these peaceful surroundings that Henry Ford, son of William and Mary Litogot Ford, was born on the early morning of July 30, 1863.

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
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
